





economic development at a glance

SPEAKER: CHRIS SIEMERLING, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SPECIALIST, CITY OF HAGERSTOWN

- » Since 2015, over \$70M has been invested into the downtown. There is an additional \$5.3M of current investment, and \$31.7M of planned investment in various stages..
- » Downtown investments include the Hagerstown Multi-Use and Sports Facility (\$90M), Field House (\$25M), and the 3rd Parking Deck (\$11M)..
- » The Meritus School of Osteopathic Medicine represents a \$150M investment in the City of Hagerstown and the region. Its regional economic impact is expected to be around \$263M (2023-2026).
- » Downtown housing is showing growth, with nearly 150+ units being developed.



MICRO ENTERPRISE GRANT PROGRAM

Up to \$5,000 reimbursement grant available for low-to-moderate income small business owners. Funds can be used for rent, salary, business equipment, operational expenses, inventory, and qualifying utilities.

INVEST HAGERSTOWN PROGRAM

In partnership with private developers, the program aspires to: inspire and enable significant redevelopment by reusing and repurposing vacant properties; create opportunities for new jobs in the city and the county; increase the value of Hagerstown's commercial and mixed use properties; strengthen and improve market rental properties and increase homeownership.

Hagerstown Business revolving fund

Business loans to provide funding for growth and expansion, rehabilitation, or façade enhancement. Small businesses or developers organized as a proprietorship, partnership, LLC or corporation with business sales less than \$5 million dollars annually are eligible.



CHALLENGES and assets

- Domestic Violence calls, City of Hagerstown:
 domestics reported 151; domestics in progress 1,358.
- » Property Crimes City of Hagerstown, 2023: total of 934 incidents.
- Property Crimes for Police Beats: Douglass Court and Parkside Home area, and Frederick Manor area:
 11 reports, 1.2% of the total property crimes.
- » Violent crimes City of Hagerstown, 2023: total of 279 incidents.
- Violent crimes for Police Beats: Douglass Court and Parkside Home area, and Frederick Manor area:
 3 reports, 1.1% of the total violent crimes.



PUBLIC Safety at a Glance

SPEAKER: CHIEF KIFER, HAGERSTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT; GERARD KENDLE, HAGERSTOWN HOUSING AUTHORITY

- » Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) is a key approach for HHA Security. Have seen benefits of these types of design interventions that put more eyes on the street.
- » Downtown revitalization efforts such as the new stadium, Field House, Maryland Theater upgrades, and the Cultural Trail have successfully utilized CPTED practices as a way to reduce crime in specific areas.
- » For HHA Security goal is to make the area friendly for friendly people and unfriendly for unfriendly people.
- » HHA Security works closely with Hagerstown Police. The HHA properties and communities are a microcosm of the City, see many of the same challenges at the neighborhood scale.



Health at a Glance

SPEAKER: EARL STONER, WASHINGTON COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT SPEAKER: NICOLE HOUSER, COMMUNITY FREE CLINIC

CHALLENGES and assets

- » Washington County top 5 health priorities: mental health, obesity/overweight, substance abuse, diabetes, healthy diet.
- » Adults with a disability represent 43.5% of Hagerstown's population, while 10.3% of children in Hagerstown have a disability.
- » 12.2% of adults in Hagerstown have no health insurance, a higher rate than the county.
- » 74.7% of adults in Hagerstown have an annual routine check-up, a lower percentage than Washington County.

HORIZON GOODWILL COMMUNITY HEALTH HUB

A joint venture of Meritus Health, Brook Lane, AHEC West, and Horizon Goodwill to bring physical and mental health services to downtown Hagerstown. The CHH offers many services and will not turn away anyone, regardless of their insurance status.

COMMUNITY FREE CLINIC

The CFC is a "safety net" health care provider for uninsured Washington County residents. Their clinic offers examinations, performs minor medical procedures, dispenses prescriptions, and provides mental health services in the way of counseling, crisis intervention, and emotional support for patients experiencing life difficulties.

washington county **Health Department**

Offers a variety of services and programs to promote healthy behaviors, prevent disease and injury and safeguard the environment. The Community Health Outreach Prevention & Promotion (CHOPP) division focuses on chronic disease prevention and management, health promotion and public health emergency planning





early childhood education at a glance

SPEAKER: VICKI ROBINSON, WASHINGTON COUNTY HEAD START

CHALLENGES and assets

- » Washington County, the "desert" of childcare: 8,500 children under 5 years old, less than 3,500 licensed spots among 163 childcare providers, less than 40% of the county children have a spot in childcare.
- » High quality, licensed, center-based childcare providers are decreasing due to the cost of providing care and lack of staffing.
- » Head Start of Washington County is funded to serve 331 children (under 5 yrs old), most of whom live below the poverty line, making it one of the largest providers in the county.



early childhood education at a glance

SPEAKER: VICKI ROBINSON, WASHINGTON COUNTY HEAD START

CHALLENGES and assets

- » Health, mental health, and family needs continue to rise and often impact children attendance, behavior, and ability to learn.
- » Head Start works with families to address all of the needs impacting the family dynamic.
- » A staffing crisis for qualified teachers is being seen on all levels of education, including for our youngest children. The number of people entering the Early Childhood Education field has dropped significantly in the last decade.

CHALLENGES and assets


- » 36.5% of Hagerstown children live in a singleparent household, rate 8% higher than in Washington County.
- » Youth (16-19) years not in school or workforce represent 16.2% of Hagerstown's population, vs. a 9% on Washington County. This trend is increasing from the past years.
- » 64% of all students in Washington County are eligible for the free lunch program (FARM), trend that has been increasing in the past years.
- » All schools in the city (12 total) have the Community Elegible Provision which allows students to receive free breakfast and lunch.


Educational attainment in the Choice Neighborhood (+25 yrs)

Girls will spend dedicated time each week in small mentoring groups that provide them with the skills and knowledge needed to counter stereotypes and obstacles and achieve their goals.


